I may be the last to submit my entry, but I really want to share my story why I return to learning and how learning changes my life and how I change others' lives because of learning. First of all, I came from a low wage earner family. So even if I want to pursue my dreams and goals for the future, it's not possible. When I graduated in highschool as class valedictorian, what I really wanted was to become a teacher. I got my full scholarship for my college study, but of course you have to maintain certain grades or become one of the dean's list. Graduated from a public school then moving to a private school is challenging. So I have a lot of things to adjust to, especially since we don't have trigonometry in class when I'm in highschool. I study as hard as I can just to understand and learn that subject, but still I didn't make it. So, I lost my scholarship in the first year of school. I asked my parents and begged them that I really want to continue my 2nd year. But because of lack of financial support, I just finished my first year in the university.

I decided to stop my study and start working to earn money and help my family when my father died. When I started earning money, I forgot my study. What sinks in my mind now is to earn money for my family. Because when my father died, I became the breadwinner. I am the eldest in the family that's why I am responsible for the rest of our family. And then, I thought of working out of the country. I worked in Taiwan for almost 8 years before I decided to apply for work here in Canada.

They said Canada is the best country. That's why, I'm dreaming to work here too just like others. I'm still helping my whole family even now even if I have my own family. But for me, it's not easy to live here. You have to work hard for yourself and your family. And now that the government has made a lot of changes for the temporary foreign workers, we are really affected.

I really want to pursue my passion and become a teacher not in the Philippines but here now in Canada. So when they open a night shift class in Maple Leaf Homes, I eagerly registered for their assessment exam. Unfortunately, there are lots of my workers registered, which is why they told me that I will start in the 2nd batch. After almost a year of waiting, the time has finally come. And I can say that I'm prepared for this.

I started my assessment last December 2024 and finished all the subjects this march 19 2025. Three months of study is not easy. I give my heart, my time, and my focus on studying, especially mathematics.

Some of my co-workers tried to take the exam but failed to make it. When this happened, they lost their courage to continue what they started. But me, I just keep my focus and determination to finish it. And through the help of my teachers Mam Laura Burris and Mam Tracey Dale, I made it! I really made it! And I'm grateful for all the help and encouragement they gave me.

Now that I passed the exams, that gives courage and determination to my other classmates in

Maple Leaf Homes that they can also do that. I also told them that they have to stay in focus when they want to achieve a goal.

I just received my diploma and started to apply for my permanent residency. And if ever they will grant me, I will continue to pursue my dream. And that is to become a teacher. Soon! And I'm willing and happy to accept all your suggestions and help for my future goals.

I really don't know how to say a lot of thanks. But, thank you CVALA for all the patience even if it is snowing or raining. I am proof that you two Mam Laura and Mam Tracey are the best teachers.

Rochel Bague - Miramichi Adult Learning

I'm, Ma. Rochel Bague, I am proud to be a Filipino from the Philippines. I am currently working here in Canada as a Temporary Foreign Worker. I' am 36 years old and a single mother, my son is 16 years old and I' am the only one who raising him without any financial help from his father. My parents couldn't afford to send me to college, so when I graduated from high school, I immediately looked for a job. I never thought about going back to school because of the extreme poverty.

At the age of 18, I got pregnant, but my ex-boyfriend wouldn't stand up for me. So, while working at a young age, I raised my son alone. When I gave birth, it never crossed my mind to go back to school again because my son needed me more, because there was no one to support him but me. I dreamed of a bright and better future for my son, so even though he was 3 years old, I was forced to go abroad. It was hard for me to leave my son, but I had no choice but to let him go. I spent 10 years in the other country. I endured not being able to be with him for many years. Because that time, that was the right choice that I need to choose.

When I returned to the Philippines, the school system was very different from before. Back then, you could get a good job just by finishing high school. But now, you need to graduate from college just to find a good job and work abroad. But I didn't lose hope. I dreamed of going abroad again even though it was impossible, but with God's help, I was lucky. In return, I have to improved my work. And now it's time for me to fulfill my dream, to finish school and to get a better job for me and for my son. I know it's going to be hard for me to fulfill my dream because I'm weak in English, but I'm going to do my best just for the good it can bring. I'm going to give it my all to the Lord, if God want me to stay here in my dream country, He will give it to me.

Joe Breau – Saint John Regional Correctional Centre

Teacher: Andrew Rouse

My name is Joseph Emile Breau. I am 28 years young. I am currently housed at the Saint John Regional Correctional Centre. I have been incarcerated over the past five and a half years between here, Dorchester, and Springhill penitentiaries. My journey in Adult Learning started here at the Saint John Regional Correction Centre with Andrew and continued onto Spring Hill with Vanessa and Sarah.

While serving my last two sentences one of 32 months and the other being two years plus a day I have taught myself to read and write. I obtained my GED in Springhill in 2023. I took the test and to my amazement I passed all five tests on my first try.

I have always thought of myself as stupid or dumb. I felt this way because I was never able to learn like others when I was young. However, I found out in 2022 from my greatest teacher ever from Springhill, Sarah, that I was a neurodivergent learner. I have been diagnosed with PTSD, CPTSD, ADD/ADHD aggressive, and FAS. Due to her experience with Neuro Divergent learners, she was able to guide me on my journey to get a GED. Since I obtained my GED, I have upgraded some of my science classes. I was focused on Chemistry when I left Springhill.

While in Springhill I was able to finish my biology 12 and Geology. I almost finished upgrading my Math 11/12 and got part way through my Chemistry. I hope to complete all the upgrades I need to go to university when I am released. My goal is to one day obtain my PhD in Chemistry with a major in pharmaceutical science and Biochemistry. I would also like to have minors in Biology and Physics.

My reason for wanting this Degree with these subject areas of focus is unique. When I was young, we had everything. I had wheelers, bikes, videogames, and a good home. We were always well fed and never wanted for anything. Then my mother met my younger brother's father Jody. He was great at first very caring and loving. Then one day he changed. He started hitting me and my mother. This started shortly after my mother gave birth to my youngest brother, who was born as result of Jody sexually assaulting my mother. I was only three years old at this point. It was like he just snapped one day and broke my mother nose, ribs, and arm. He made both me and my baby brother watch as he did it. I can still remember the crunching noises from each time one of her bones was broken. Eventually someone called the cops, but they did not arrive until after he had also beat me so bad that I was unable to walk or sit without feeling a great deal of pain. The cops removed my mother, brothers and I, from the house. They arrested Jody for the sexual assault of my mother and aggravated assault of a minor times two for the beating of me and one of my brothers. In the end he received a sentence of eight years in prison, and we thankfully did not see him again for many years.

What happened between this incident and now is the true reason I have the plan I do. After meeting with CPS, we moved back to Woodstock New Brunswick. While there it was just my brothers, myself and mom for the first three years. I also got to meet my adopted father

during this time and began having visits with him. I started school in Woodstock and right from Kindergarten I was a slow learner compared to my peers. Noone knew I was a neurodivergent learner back then. I was constantly falling behind my class in school. Once I started in school my mother met a new man named John. John was great he loved us boys and had two daughters of his own Kate and Amanda. Kate and Amanda were excellent siblings.

One day I got out of hand at the house and broke the brand-new washer and dryer. My adopted father was called, and I told I was going to live with him and my stepmother and two older stepbrothers Tyler and Scott. Scott was an awesome stepbrother and was always good to me, however, Tyler had other plans. Tyler began sexually assaulting me almost immediately when I was seven years old and continued until I was eleven. I had to go the hospital multiply time to receive stitches because of this.

During the time I was with my adopted father my mother had become addicted to opioids. This addiction ruined my mother's life and had a negative impact my brothers and me. My brothers were placed in care I was allowed to stay as I was older. I still remember the first time I had to help my mother intravenously inject her pills. I remember seeing her blood go into the needle as I pulled back the plunger and her starting to cry and she told me, "This is the only time Joesph I promise". There were obviously more times. A mother is a boys first true love that's why we are called mamas boys. But opioids affected this relation between my mother and my brothers and me.

My brother Tyler and I have spent massive amounts of our adult lives incarcerated because of how this relationship with our mother affected us. My other brother Zachary is currently homeless with our mother as well. My mother is still heavily addicted to opioids. My mother has started the fentanyl harm reduction program offered at the River Stone Recovery Centre.

This story is the reason I want to pursue what I do in education. Once I get my PhD I will be able to focus on opioid addiction and help people suffering from the disease of opioid addiction like my mother. Completing these degrees at university will allow me to change the world for people suffering like my mother has for most of my life. My thesis will be based on finding a way to change the molecular structure of opioids, so a person won't get sick or have other negative side effects from withdrawals while trying to quit.

In closing I can only hope that the people reading this stary are rooting for an underdog like me, who didn't get his GED until he was 27 years old. I am currently almost thirty years old and still have a long way to go. However, it is my hope that one day you will read about a man named Joseph Emile Breau and the great things he did to fight addiction, and you will remember this story.

David Bryan – Woodstock Adult Learning Centre (WVALA)

I am David Bryan, a 50-year-old adult learner who has decided to change my life by going back to school. Upon leaving All Age School I went to secondary school where I completed the first 3 months. I visited a job site over Christmas break where I was earning money for the first time in my life and I realized the love I had for this job, therefore I decided to end my secondary education. Nevertheless, I was able to obtain a masonry skill in just six months. I gained a new skill, but I had a gut feeling that something was missing. Even though I knew what it was, I believed it was too late to turn back. Everything changed, however, when I became a parent, and I soon discovered that I could not relate to my kids academically. Despite feeling unfulfilled, I continued working in masonry since I lacked the courage to return to school because I now had a financial obligation to support my family. It wasn't until I came to Canada from my home country and felt the need to migrate that I understood that I could not do it without a secondary education. I made the decision that the time had come to return to my studies. I wanted to achieve something to bring great pride to my family.

When I chose to go back, I had no idea where to begin. With so much time away from school, I was at the bottom. I asked around to see where I could start. I was introduced to the Adult Learning Centre, where I met Maria. When I expressed my interest in furthering my education, she informed me that the distant learning program was overseen by Calvin, who was now on vacation. However, she offered to assist me until Calvin returned. On that day, she stated something that transformed my life instantly: "We are going to help you get an education." I felt energised! So I was registered, and she assigned me some tasks, and I had no idea what to do. She explained a few things to me, and I went home and phoned my daughter, who also explained a few things to me, and thus my journey began. Calvin contacted me in August 2024, and we met at the library where he detailed the next steps, which marked the beginning of my educational adventure. Calvin has been an inspiration, a hard-working and kind teacher to me thus far. With his guidance, I feel I will be able to attain my objectives. So far, I've been able to accomplish things I've never done in my life. I am better able to solve problems, I am more confident, I can connect with and converse with intelligent and educated people without feeling inferior. The knowledge I have acquired has also equipped me with essential life skills, including improved time management and the ability to bounce back from challenges.

My future aspirations are to attain a better paid job so that I can better support my family. Also, I'd like to be able to share the knowledge I've gained so that my family and community may be proud of my successes, as well as encourage other potential adult learners that it's never too late! In addition, I aspire to be ablet o guide others to success. I am excited to continue till the end because, while juggling work and studies is difficult, I am dedicated to the task at hand.

Shae-Lynn Douthwright – South East Adult Education

When I first began attending school again I was living in a homeless shelter and battling a heavy addiction. As a child, I was taken from my mother and, eventually placed in what they call a group home. Have you ever wondered what a group home looks like from the child's point of view? There were three other residence when I first arrived and, we each had our own room. The workers were there during the day, then a new worker for the overnight shift. The first day I went there, I can remember the entire forty-five-minute drive. I sat there in silence terrified of where I was going and devastated that I wouldn't be living with my two sisters anymore. I felt that because I had self harmed, that I was a bad child. That I wasn't good enough for a family. I struggled badly with the rules in the group home. Now that I'm older I understand that had I listened it could have bettered my future. but as a child I could not understand that. I ran away as do many other youth. I was taken in by an old man and taken advantage of for four years before he passed away. I went from his apartment to the Miramichi youth correctional center, and then back to a group home. Sometimes I would be court ordered to rehab instead of Miramichi. So many nights I cried myself to sleep wishing I could go home to my mother. Since then I've battled away a deadly addiction as well as homelessness. Although I dreamt of a better life not only for myself but for my children. Since starting my GED, I've gone to rehab and rented a room and I have been sober for thirty three days, at first I missed a lot of days, one excuse after another. despite my absence my teacher remained patient, accepting, and encouraging. After a short while I was ready to take my first exam. As the questions flew by with ease my belief in myself growing with every passing question. When I hit the final screen and my score popped up saying I had passed it brought with it the idea that maybe I actually could do this! Ive been working away at it a bit more serious now a days. I'm waiting on my reading exam while studying for math. I need to accomplish this, I want to be the first in my family to go to collage or university for political science. My hope is to make much needed changed to child protective services. There have already been studies done that explain that a child placed in care, most often, will experience more trauma than if they had been left in the neglectful or abusive home. I have constantly searched for a family that loves me and a place to call home. By completing my schooling, I will finally be able to have exactly that. Most of all I need to do this because I want to make my children proud. My life is turning around for the better and for that I am grateful.

Katrina Evans - South East Adult Education

Hello, my name is Katrina! Yes, like the hurricane. No I was not named after it, I came before! I am a twenty four year old from Southern Ontario now living in Moncton, New Brunswick! I am writing this to share why I have returned to learning.

I grew up being homeschooled by my amazing parents. Primarily my mum taught me, however, my dad helped with math. I had attended pre-k at a school but the teachers observed that I was not learning well in that environment. One of my teachers suggested homeschooling and my parents decided that would be the best solution for me.

I did much better learning at home! I was always done before school let out and because of this, I was able to spend more time playing outside or honing my creativity in the form of singing, dancing, drawing and eventually, writing. I also loved reading and would often stay up late with my head in a book. Don't tell my parents!

I ran into trouble with my schooling around the age of fifteen. I had been going to counselling for a little while and my counsellor started to suspect I had something called Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. That was something my parents had wondered about as well. They found an amazing trauma therapist who worked with me for a few years.

I remembered a lot of traumatic events that had happened when I was a child that made it very hard for me to focus on anything. My life felt like it had been flipped upside down. I couldn't sleep well. I developed severe anxiety. My schooling fell onto the back burner as I just couldn't cope with life.

My parents were amazing. They helped me every step of the way. They let me take the time I needed to heal from the memories. But unfortunately I got caught in a cycle of depression and struggled with motivation. This made it very hard for me to do my schoolwork.

At the age of nineteen I was given a diagnosis of Lupus. This autoimmune disease makes my body sore everyday. It also causes my brain to degenerate which causes me to have a hard time remembering things. This made things even harder for me and I pushed my education even further on to the previously mentioned back burner.

Due to my anxiety, Lupus and PTSD, I had put off earning my GED, or CAEC as it is now called, until last year. With the help and encouragement of my parents, I finally reached out and got a teacher assigned to me.

My teacher has been a kind and wonderful support to me as we have worked together to achieve my goal of getting my CAEC certification. She has watched me become more confident in my skills. I have always struggled greatly with math and yet I find myself having an easier time doing it in my day to day life.

I have since passed my English reading/writing tests and my social studies test with flying colours! I am studying for my science test next along with continually working on math.

It has been a long road full of ups and downs. But I have learned a lot from it and am incredibly grateful for the support of my family and my teacher, Indu.

Earning my CAEC will open up many job opportunities for me, including my dream job of becoming a 911 dispatcher. I have always loved helping others and could see myself thriving in this job.

The older I have gotten, the more I have realized that all learners, both prior and present have each their own story. Today I would like to take the opportunity to share my own.

Throughout grade school I did very well. Kindergarten through grade eight my alphabetical grades did not fall any lower then a "B". I very much enjoyed school, I excelled in E.L.A, and found a lot of happiness in Art class, along with Sciences.

I attended my middle school graduation in June of 2018 and went on to high school.

In my freshman year of high school, I was faced with an unimaginable situation for my then fifteen year old self. I was given the news that I was unknowingly thirty-seven weeks pregnant, with a sweet little girl who at that time was due any day, and therefore during that time my newborn daughter would now take priority over my education. I took about a year away from school, until not more then a year later I was faced again with more life changing news, however this one was a devastation. My great-grandmother and primary caregiver since the young age of three, passed away unexpectedly on May 29th, 2021 with Cancer.

Within what should have been my grieving period yet again I was faced with numerous other challenges, including but not limited to drug addiction in a very serious degree, I suffered homelessness, along with constant domestic violence. I endured these circumstances for almost 6 months, although it felt like a lifetime. Faced with these heartaches and fright or flight responses for long enough, I moved in with my beautiful guardian angel on earth, my great aunt Brenda Lee.

After my first meal in days and eighteen hours of consecutive sleep I came off all illicit substances on my own, and have not looked back since August 21st 2021, now soon to be four years of well earned sobriety.

In September 2021 I enrolled at Moncton High School, did very well and attended for almost a full year. This is when I was faced with my second move of that year due to unfortunate circumstances and I relocated to a domestic violence shelter. Due to the distance and no transportation available I discontinued my education for then the second time.

The following year and a half, I twiddled my thumbs, unemployed and feeling as though I had little to no hope that things would turn out any better for me. This is the first time I attempted to take my GED. I wrote practice test, after practice test. I had exam level knowledge but unfortunately could not put it to use during that time because I was only eighteen. Frustration had overcame me, and at that point I felt unworthy of any form of success. Now at twenty-one years old here I am, for what feels like the hundredth time, I am seeking the end of my fighting

journey, and on the road, hand in hand with determination to achieve my degree and continue onto post secondary school to take my "Child and Youth" course, to help changes the lives of children and youth who have experienced similar to what I have.

My education is important to me because of the fight I had to endure and continue to do so in order to accomplish it. Something I was told, at a very young age is that nothing worth it comes easily, and that we fight tooth and nail for the things we know we deserve.

Depuis que je suis enfant, l'école à toujours occupé une place spéciale dans mon cœur. Pour moi, apprendre n'a jamais été une obligation, mais un véritable plaisir, une porte ouvres vers un avenir meilleur. Aujourd'hui, je souhaite partage mon parcours, marqué par des défis, des sacrifies et une profonde détermination, parce que je crois sincèrement que l'apprentissage change des vies.

Tout a commence dans mon pays d'origine. Dès mon plus jeune âge, j'étais fascinée par les livres, les cahiers et le savoir. Je me souviens encore de me premiers jours d'école. L'excitation de découvrir un nouveau monde, le bruit des pages qu'on tourne, l'odeur de la craie sur le tableau noir. Pourtant, aller à l'école n'était pas aussi simple qu'il y paraît. Chaque matin, je me réveillais très tôt, souvent avant lever du soleil, pour mes préparer. La route pour arrive à l'école était longue et fatigante, mais jamais je ne me suis plainte. Chaque pas que je faisais me rapprochait de mon rêve : apprendre, réussir, et devenir quelqu'un de meilleur.

Lorsque j'étais à l'école, une épreuve majeure s'est présent; une grossesse imprévue qui a bouleversée mon quotidien. Bien que cet événement fût porteur de doute et de remisse en question, j'ai refusé de laisse cette situation définir mon destin jusqu'à mon accouchement, j'ai tenu à pour suivre mes cours, convaincue que le savoir et la persévérance pouvaient m'aide à transforme ma réalité. La naissance de mon fils marqua le début d'un nouveau chapitre, empreint d'amour mais aussi des responsabilités immenses.

Mais grandir dans un environnement difficile signifie aussi apprendre à se battre. Avant d'arriver au Canada, ma vie n'a pas été facile. Il y avait des jours ou je me demandais si j'allais pouvoir continuer mes études. Les obstacles étaient nombreux; le manque de ressources, des conditions de vie précaires et parfois même le découragement. Pourtant, malgré tout, je n'ai jamais perdu cette flamme intérieure. Aller à l'école était ma façon de résister, de croire en un avenir meilleur. Je savais qu'un jour, tout ce travail acharné porterait ses fruits.

Aujourd'hui, mère d'un enfant, je poursuis mes études avec acharnement. Mon ambition ne se limite pas à l'obtention de mon GED ou à une carrière en médecine; je souhaite également contribuer activement à l'amélioration des conditions d'accès à l'éducation pour tous, en particulier pour les femmes et les personnes issues de milieu défavorisés. Je rêve de collaborer avec des associations et des initiatives favorisant l'émancipation par l'éducation.

Lorsque je suis arrivée au Canada, j'ai compris que ce nouveau départ serait un défi, mais aussi une opportunité incroyable. Rependre mes études ici, dans un environnement complétement différent, avec une nouvelle langue et une nouvelle culture, était intimidant. Mais j'étais déterminée. Chaque matin, en franchissant les portes de l'école, je sentais que je construisais quelque chose d'important; un avenir, une meilleure version de moi-même. J'ai appris nom seulement des matières scolaires, mais aussi la persévérance, le courage et la résilience.

Aujourd'hui, réalise à quel point l'apprentissage a changé ma vie. Ce n'est pas seulement une question de connaissances, mais de confiance, de persévérance et de rêves réalises. L'éducation m'a donné une voix, une identité et une force intérieure que rien ni personne ne pourra jamais m'enlever. Aller à l'école m'a appris que, peu importe d'où l'on vient ou les obstacle rencontrés l'éducation reste la clé qui ouvre toutes les portes.

I've learned a lot in my life.

I come from a good home that taught me about values, manners, morals, and all of life's general basics. I moved out young and learned how to live on my own and be independent and the importance of following my dreams and aspirations, and of reaching for my goals.

I am a well-educated individual, who received honours in highschool before earning three diplomas in four years of college, often on the Deans List. Later in life when I realized my passion for cooking, I decided to pursue it. I apprenticed, finished top of my class in the academic portion, and acquired and learned the fundamentals, as well as the necessary skill and knowledge to obtain my Red Seal in Culinary Arts.

I've learned a lot in my life.

Now, at the age of forty-three, I'm sitting in jail, where I have been incarcerated for the past 22 months, serving a sentence for my first offence. This indicates that I have also learned how to hit rock bottom and screw up <u>BAD</u>.

It's amazing that it took me <u>FORGETTING</u> everything I've learned throughout my life and getting arrested for making a very poor decision, subsequently being incarcerated in order for me to learn the one thing all my years of academic studies and life experiences never taught me.

In here I have learned about MYSELF.

With no deadlines, or responsibilities, or daily "doings" with nothing but TIME; I have been able to look deep within myself. Search inside myself. To learn who it is that Jason Mackenzie is, and not only what is important to me in life, what it is that I want my life to mean and what I want to make of it. I never would've thought that I would learn more about myself being incarcerated in jail. I made a couple of horrible choices that lead me here and I regret them exponentially. But at the same time, I am forever grateful that the bad choices I made wound up providing me the opportunity to slow-down, take a breather, and educate myself on the ONE thing all my years of studying, working, and socializing never taught.

ME. MYSELF. I.

I like to think it's not too late, that I'm not learning this most valuable bit of knowledge too late in life. I have a term for it, and how come to think of it as ME-ducation, and it's a class where I am both student and teacher, and what comprises my textbook is a reflection on my life. Everything that was written in between the lines that I was always moving too fast and working too hard to see and learn and UNDERSTAND.

The institution I'm at is called a "correctional centre", and I'm using the knowledge I'm learning about myself, along with the tools and programs offered here, to do just that. CORRECT MYSELF.

Seven other men join me every morning Monday to Friday as we participate in a new program being implemented across provincial jails. I feel privileged and am grateful for each one of them. We all come from different backgrounds, ethnic and otherwise. Yet, despite all our differences, we share one very common similarity; somehow, some way, WE ALL LOST OUR WAY.

WE ALL LOST OURSELVES.

With their help, I am learning more about myself than I ever knew before. For the first REAL time in my life, I'm learning about ME. THE REAL ME. Everything they share I'm able to apply to my inner self studying, and they help me learn more about myself each passing day.

Learning isn't just about textbooks, nor just hands on experience. It isn't just life experiences, coaching or being coached, or all the things we subconsciously "pick up along the way". Learning, TRULY learning about ourselves is actually taking all of these elements together and taking the time to analyze and study them as one complete entity.

In a few months my time will have been served, and I will be returning to society. I'm actually terrified to death of this, because for the first time I will be starting from nothing. With nothing. But I am also elated, excited, thrilled, encouraged, proud, and curious. Because this time, as I re-start the second half of my life, I'm starting with not only a new perspective, not only with EVERYTHING I learned in school and work and life during the first forty-one years. Now I'm starting over with the most valuable piece of knowledge I have ever learned; MYSELF.

This time, I know MYSELF. More so than ever before.

I have learned who I am, and I am so excited to get back into the world. To give myself back to the world. Educate it on the real Jason Mackenzie and apply everything I am to making it a better place. A brighter place.

Now that I've learned and discovered this most important piece of teaching and knowledge, I'll forever be, and forever keep LEARNING ABOUT MYSELF.

My name is Jason Marr and I graduated from the GOALS program at the Saint John Learning Exchange and it has changed and saved my life in every way possible.

Before I started GOALS I was what I considered a high school drop out. I used to hate everything about learning.

I stopped putting any effort into my school work long before I left high school in grade 11.

I was a very depressed burnt-out kid. As each school day went by, I became more and more stressed. I was already trying to stay afloat of my mental struggles and high school was the final push underwater. Many of my days began with bullying on the school bus and tears down my face. I was scared to even leave the house and get on that bus, let alone entering the school doors ever. Anxiety was all that I could feel. I didn't know what it felt like to have a normal school day.

Deep down, I wanted to be better than who I was. I wanted to be smarter.

I wanted to be healthy.

I wanted to be anything that wouldn't make me a victim to bullying. But every time I tried, it felt impossible to find the answers I was looking for. My suicidal thoughts became stronger as my depression got worse. I felt my life was a tricking clock, and I was running out of time. I just couldn't carry on feeling the way I felt and falling so behind in school.

I made countless visits to the guidance council at my high school. I tried to make it clear that if I don't drop out, I won't be able to handle school and life anymore. I'm not sure if she knew exactly what I meant, but it was the closest I could get to saying how I felt. One day during another one of my visits to the guidance council, the Saint John Learning Exchange was mentioned. A place that offers a program called GOALS for younger people to compete their credits to get their adult diploma at their own pace.

Despite my depression, self-doubt, and my trauma, I wanted to give one last chance at learning.

The guidance council made a phone call to the Learning Exchange, and soon enough she got me an interview.

I left high school, had a few months break, and after taking the interview I found out I could get in the following semester at the Learning Exchange to start my first class. The moment that changed my life before I even knew it.

When I started my first class at the SJLE I noticed right away how different it was from any other school I've been in. There were pride flags, posters about upcoming events, and signs that made you feel welcome everywhere in the building. Every teacher and staff member made you

feel like you were home before they even knew your name. I felt safe for the first time in a learning environment.

I was actually able to compete my work because I wasn't stressed with an overwhelming amount of work to do, plus there was never any homework. All your work you did at the SJLE stayed at the SJLE.

No one tolerated bullying or mean comments, which caused me to lose the anxiety I would have right before school.

I finally was beginning to have self-worth and happiness, something I haven't felt this much in years.

I changed like night to day. My outlook on life and learning used to be so negative, until GOALS, then I became much more positive and actually liked learning new things.

With this newfound love for knowledge, I began to develop ideas and goals for the future and exploring my passions when I used to be so afraid of even thinking about next week, yet alone my long-term future, but now I was excited for what was to come.

Each thing I did during and after graduating the GOALS program has brought me one step closer to my future goals. Before starting my first class, I used to have no goals, no hope, and didn't want a future at all. Now, I want to be a motivational speaker, a poet, a photographer, I want to help people, spread love, learn as much as I can, take every opportunity that comes my way, and try as many new things as I can.

If I had given up and never walked through those SJLE doors when I did, I wouldn't be here writing this speech today. I'm grateful I went back to learning. I'm grateful to be alive.

If you feel like you're at the end of your road and education isn't your thing, maybe the problem isn't learning itself, but it's where and what you're learning. I strongly believe there is a passion for everyone out there. Don't be afraid to get up and find yours. Don't be afraid to change your life because you never know, it might be the very thing that saves you.

Along my difficult journey I have had to deal with many struggles, from my parents splitting up when I was very young to where I currently am today, a single mother who will soon be getting her CAEC! I will now tell you about my own personal journey.

By the time I was born, all my older siblings, except my brother Carl who is a year and a half older than me, were living with other family members. When I was 4 years old my parents split up. They both tried their best to take care of us. Unfortunately, they had struggles of their own to deal with, which in turn hindered us from getting our education.

Most of my younger years were spent living with my mom. She moved around a lot during these years, which made it very difficult for me, having to learn from so many different teachers along with trying to make new friends. This eventually led to me dropping out of high school.

We moved in with my mother, and I started to once again fight for my status so that I could continue with my GED. As I was getting closer to my due date, my mother suffered a serious injury which would eventually lead to her losing her leg. She eventually was sent to Dr. Everett Chalmers Hospital in Fredericton. While she was there, I was also there where my beautiful baby daughter, Jaylin, was born. Since we were fortunate enough to be in the same hospital together, this allowed my mother to be able to meet her beautiful granddaughter. I also got my status, which would allow me to continue working on my GED.

Upon my completion of my CAEC, I intend to do one of two things. One possibility is starting my own business as a hairdresser. The other one is going to Community College to become a carpenter. I cannot wait for this next chapter of my life to start!

While growing up, learning at school was one of my favourite ways to spend my time. My family was situated in one of the rural communities outside of Miramichi so public outings were sparse and going to school was one of the only opportunities I had to learn of the outside world.

All throughout school, I had a special passion for Science. I would spend months prior to the annual science fairs planning and perfecting my presentations in hopes one day I would advance. In grade 7, I was fortunate enough to be awarded 2nd place regionally and 3rd place provincially for my efforts. The pride and confidence I felt during this time in my life was unlike anything I had ever experienced before.

Unfortunately, after beginning my first year of high school I began to face incessant bullying and fell into addiction as a method of coping. I was expelled from school for poor attendance, and consequently was kicked out of both my parents' homes. After years of hardship, I got myself sober and began working customer service jobs at any company who would hire me in order to provide for myself.

I learned relatively quickly that dealing with the public in low level customer service jobs was and is extremely mentally taxing. Each passing day brought nothing but a mediocre pay cheque and low self-esteem; I was losing hair, losing weight, and losing sight of any hope for a better life. I went through jobs at an alarming rate, none of them brought me happiness or fulfillment.

In July of 2024 I was wrongly terminated from yet another customer service job I had been giving my all to. I was devastated and angry, but I finally understood that if I wanted my life to change, I had to be the one to change it. It was shortly after this I got into contact with Kevin, the Executive Director of Miramichi Adult Learning Inc and scheduled a time to be pretested for the Canadian Adult Educational Credential.

Within the first month of returning to classes, I had accomplished more than I ever dreamed was possible. My self-confidence sky-rocketed, I aced all of my unit tests, and most importantly I went home each day genuinely proud of myself.

Since then, I have passed three out of five final exams with flying colours, registered myself for Early Childhood Education in Fall of 2025, applied for several summertime student positions with the government, and am on track to be a 2025 graduate. When I complete my studies, I hope to open a daycare facility that provides childcare to low income families who would otherwise be unable to afford it. Returning to learning has not only provided me with a purpose, but also with the self-love I had been so desperately searching for in all the wrong places.

As an immigrant who came here in her middle age, after arriving in Canada and settling in Fredericton, I faced the challenge of career reorientation and reflected on how to lead my life with true value and purpose. The journey of finding my motivation to continue learning in a new environment is also the journey of reflecting on the long-buried memories that linger in my heart.

She came to me again. Through the window of the classroom where I was studying in high school, she asked my classmates with eager anticipation, "Is Jiajia here or not?", "Do you know where she is?", "Do you have any idea when she will be back?"

Hiding behind the back door, I listened and observed the whole conversation. After getting the answers I had told my classmates previously, she left disappointed and sad, and I had a sigh of relief. That was the last time I saw her. Before that, I avoided her many times.

When the memories returned, the loneliness and sadness of her departure waved in my head. Her facial expression, which had left no trace on me at the time, kept hammering at my mind fifteen years later.

She was my classmate in Grades 7 and 8. She was a kind girl and always quiet at that time. Though her academic performance was not outstanding, I knew she studied hard with diligence. Although we didn't talk much, I had a good impression of her. Everything seemed so "normal", nothing to be concerned about.

But how could a perfectly healthy person fall apart in such a short time? In just 3 or 4 years? We encountered each other downtown and talked for about 4 hours, and she updated me a lot about her life and family, through which I knew life was quite difficult for her. What I didn't know was that from that day on, every day she would spend hours talking about the same thing to me.

Years after that moment, I have helped hundreds of people in need through different programs I initiated, such as a 10-year-long digital literacy program and a 3-year-long legal assistance program. But every time I think about her, I pray that I was not the last straw she could have grabbed at that moment. I was too young and immature to recognize how much she needed help. I was not the right person at that time and only felt overwhelmed, fleeing- perhaps just like others around her- from the consequences.

I care about her, though this care comes too late. I grew up in a rural, underprivileged area in China, where everyone, to a greater or lesser extent, faced financial, physical, parental, and

mental difficulties and struggles across generations. I care about all of them, and at the same time, I knew I needed to break out of this circle. For a long time, I was driven by this responsibility to keep learning and excel in school so that I could have the opportunity to receive an education at a university, which ultimately gave me the capacity to help them—villagers in my hometown, systematically at a very early age.

But when I settled in Canada and continued to think about her—the first person who ever came to me for help, and whom I let down—everything suddenly became clear to me. I realized that I had found my calling and my purpose: I want to help people, ease their pain, and enhance their well-being. Ultimately, I want to make this my career and life's mission.

Now, I am focusing on my goal of pursuing a social work career in the future, starting with applying to a social work program at university and learning the necessary knowledge, skills, methods and theories.

And, of course, the English language. I have been learning English with Teacher Shelley from United for Literacy, she has helped me a lot and witnessed my progress. I will give her all the praise and applause, she is one of the best teachers I have ever had. I will continue learning and helping people in my own way here in Canada, just like she did.
